

A VISUAL LANGUAGE:

The Andersonian Road



- **The Power of Symmetry:** When you stand before a roadside attraction—be it a gas station or a giant blue whale—center yourself. Align the horizon. Let the subject occupy the middle of your frame. Symmetry suggests a world that is ordered and whimsical.
- **The Frontal Gaze:** Shoot objects flat-on. Avoid dramatic, skewed angles. A "flat" perspective transforms a simple building into a graphic illustration.
- **The Pastel Palette:** Look for the "sun-faded" versions of primary colors. Instead of red, look for dusty turquoise. The desert light is your natural filter; use the "golden hour" to soften the harsh edges of the concrete.
- **The Still Life in the Mundane:** A half-eaten slice of pie, a stack of vintage napkins, or a single key hanging on a motel hook. Treat these small details with the same reverence as a grand landscape.

The "Wes Anderson" aesthetic isn't just about pretty colors; it's about intentionality.

DAY 01: ILLINOIS

THE URBAN GENESIS & THE FIBERGLASS GIANTS

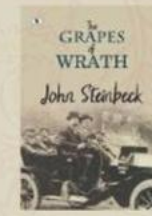

Itinerary

DAY 01 ILLINOIS

THE START OF THE LINE

Morning:

Start at the "Begin Route 66" sign in Chicago, then enjoy a legendary breakfast at Lou Mitchell's.

Afternoon:

Drive to Wilmington to meet the Bentz Olds and grab the famous fried chicken at Del Rhea's.

Evening:

Arrive in Pontiac for a neon-dinner at Pull-a-Dot Drive in during the magical blue hour.

Night:

Rest at the luxurious (and very Wes Anderson) Mayo Hotel in Tulsa or stay at a quiet roadside spot in Elk City.

DAY 02 MISSOURI

THE GATEWAY WEST

Morning:

Visit the Gateway Arch in St. Louis for a symmetrical sunrise view, then grab coffee at the retro Donut Drive-In.

Afternoon:

Drive through the Ozarks to Meramec Caverns and enjoy a "concrete" shake at the legendary Ted Drewes.

Evening:

Stop in St. James for a rustic BBQ dinner at Missouri Hick and capture the sun setting over the rolling hills.

Night:

Settle in at the historic Wagon Wheel Motel in Cuba—the oldest continuously operating motel on the entire route.

DAY 04 TEXAS

THE PANHANDLE VASTNESS

Morning:

Visit the "Learning Tower of Texas" in Droom, then stop at the U-Drop Inn for a lesson in Art Deco symmetry.

Afternoon:

Grab a "Midpoint Pie" in Adrian—the exact mathematical center between Chicago and Los Angeles.

Evening:

Head to Cadillac Ranch in Amarillo to spray paint the buried cars as the sky turns a deep, dusty violet.

Night:

Settle in at the Big Texan Steak Ranch or find a quiet spot in Glenrio, the eerie and beautiful ghost town on the border.
